

In the sky, the **VAPOUR** condenses and forms **FLUFFY CLOUDS**.


When the clouds become too heavy, they announce, "**TIME TO SHOWER!**"

Moral of the story: Consistent efforts make great results.


THE ADVENTURE OF FOUR FRIENDS

Moral: Teamwork and sharing bring happiness to everyone.




